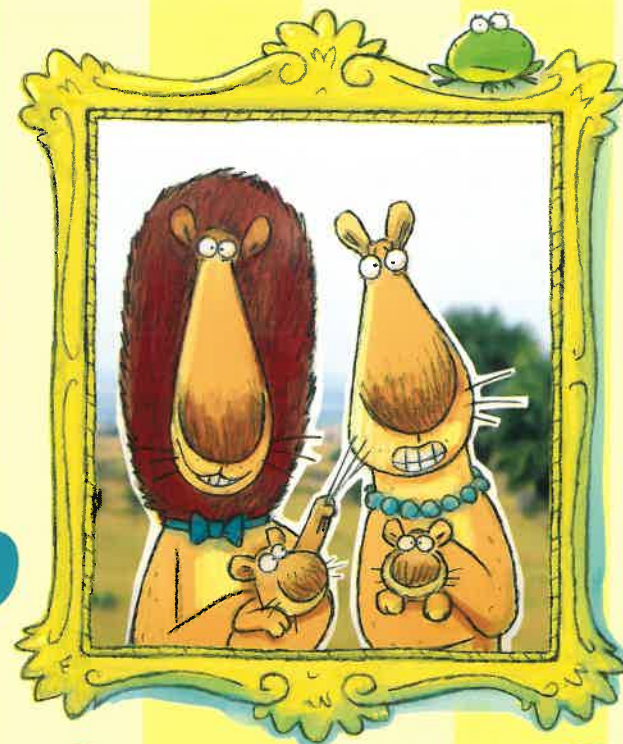
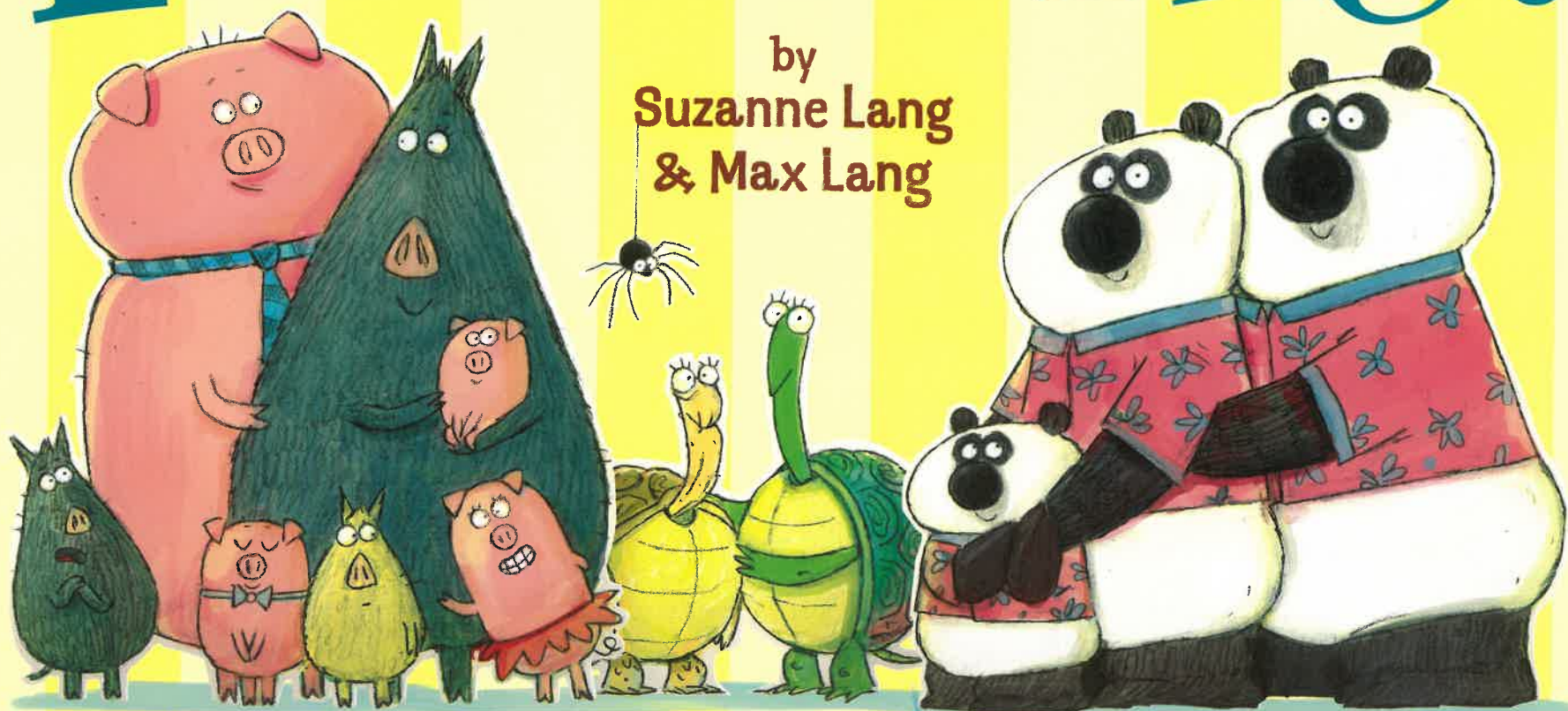

Some children have none.



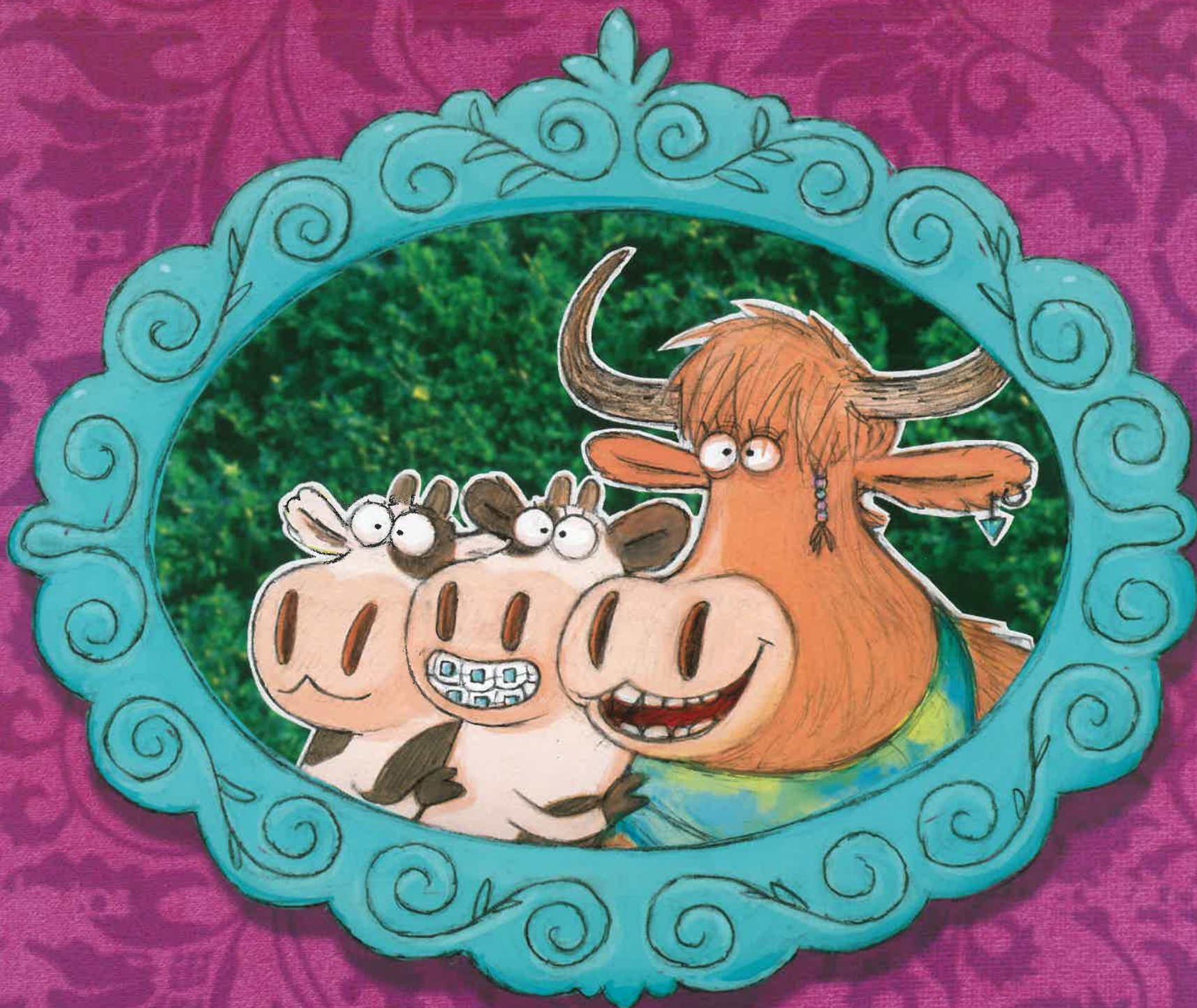
Some children have two dads.

Some children have two mothers.

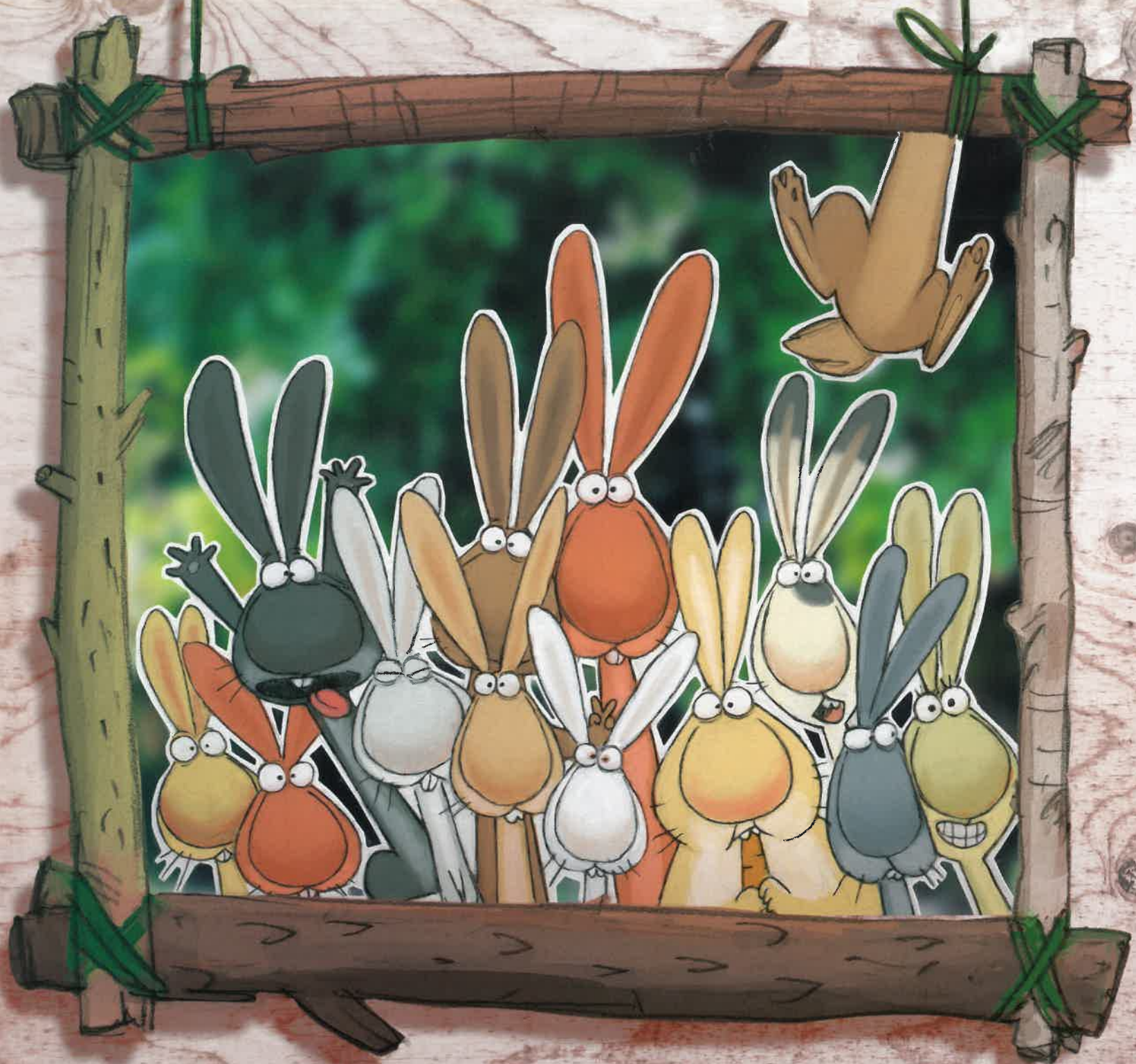
Eucalyptus (leaves & branches)

Some have a mom and a pop.



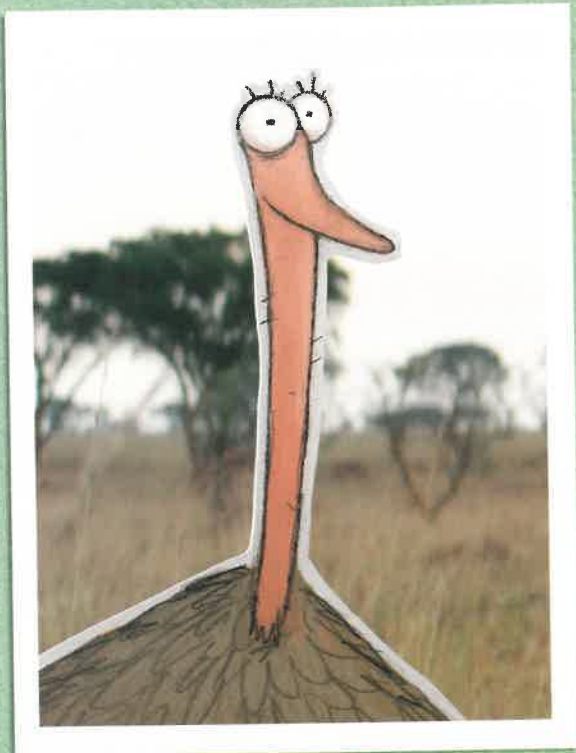
Some children's parents are married.

and a Great-Aunt Sue,**

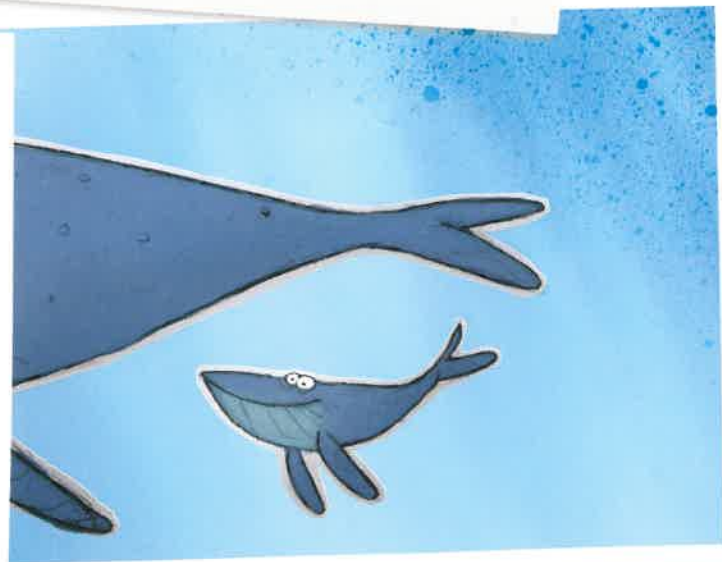
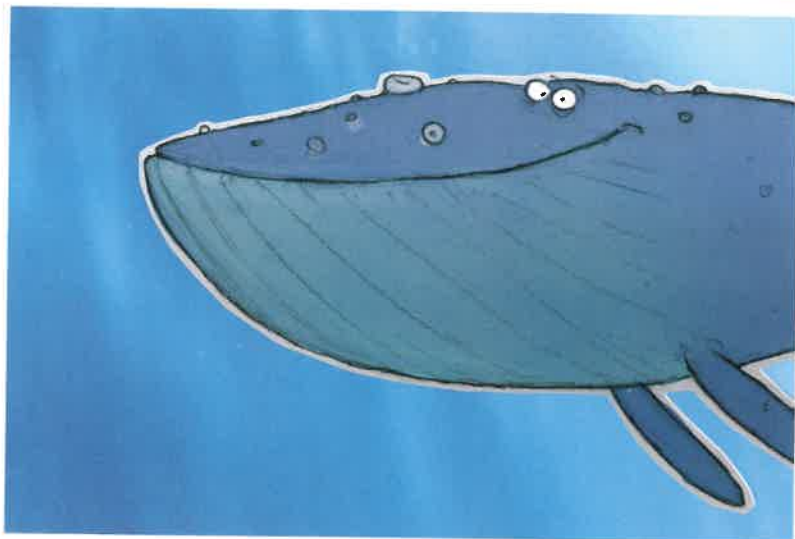
